

## KS1 Comparisons

### **EYFS**

Children begin to discover that there are differences and similarities in their own lives and others by talking about how they celebrate events such as Christmas. They begin to understand that they are similar to others but unique. They will learn about growing older through celebrating their birthdays as well as birth and death in R. E. They will talk about topics such as families and homes in R.E and PHSE and make comparison learning that they although may be similar to others, they are unique. They will make comparisons with others through discussion in their play and looking at their busy books for example toys, experiences and visits. Children will often compare individually their own old and new items e.g. shoes and clothes, as well as those from different generations.

### **Year 1**

In year 1 children begin to understand there are differences and similarities in their own lives and others by making simple comparisons for example about how they celebrate bonfire night. They move on to look at this again with toys and transport as well comparing changes in toys and transport over time.

In Battle of Hastings they use picture evidence to support comparisons looking for differences and similarities with their lifestyle with that of living in a castle.

The social and cultural comparisons of homes/ toys/ pastimes/ transport and lifestyles will be built on over all year groups when studying other periods.

### **Year 2**

Children learn about Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale and compare their lives looking at similarities and differences whilst thinking about inequalities of black people first thought about in Y1.

Through the Changes in Home since Victorian period topic children recap changes in social and cultural changes by looking at objects/ inventions over different generations and linking and building on Y1 topics changes in toys and transport. It also continues to build on comparing homes from the past started in Y1 with castle comparison.

In the Tudor monarch topic children can start to compare different English monarchs.
